The report was adopted by majority vote at the meeting on Pecem-


ber 8, 1976. Additional views and comments are included.

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#### **SUMMARY**

Acting under the direction of H. Res. 988, the House Commission on Information and Facilities inventoried current usage of all space under the jurisdiction of the House of Representatives. This inventory was then analyzed in terms of the possibility of reassigning

certain space in order to facilitate the legislative processes.

Categories of need for access to the floor ranging on a scale from A to E were established. The categories encompass (a) the Leadership of the House; (b) the Cierk of the House and certain offices thereunder; the Sergeant at Arms and certain offices thereunder; the Doorkeeper of the House and certain offices thereunder; (c) standing and select committees of the House and individual Members of the House; (d) nonlegislative committees, commissions and other bodies and certain functions of the Clerk, Sergeant at Arms, Doorkeeper, and Postmaster without need for immediate Floor access; (e) nonlegislative House groups and political party organizations; executive branch liaison offices and other noncongressional offices.

Additionally, operations associated with Categories C, D, and E activities were queried as to the use of their current space and their reaction to possible relocation. As expected, there is a general reluctance to relocate. Nevertheless, certain possible relocations of Categories C. D, and E activities now occupying space that could be more suitably utilized for Categories A and B activities can be expected to enhance the legislative processes. The criterion, of course, is need for proximity to the floor of the House. This need is clearly greatest for Categories A and B activities and smallest for activities

of Category E.



#### RECOMMENDATIONS

The Commission recommends:

1. Relocation of the two-level office assigned to the Clerk of the House and used by the Bill Clerk, the Journal Clerk, the Reading Clerks, and the Tally Clerk from its present site (on the third floor of the Capitol next to the upper part of Statuary Hall) to the location of the principal service office of the House Document Room adjacent to the floor level of Statuary Hall.

2. Conversion of the aforementioned two-level office of the Clerk into off-the-floor work space for Members, which would include partitioned areas to be available on a first-come-first-served basis to insure equitable usage, so that Members could do certain types of

official business while remaining close to the floor.

3. Relocation of all of the facilities of the House Document Room from the Capitol to the present location of the House Publications Distribution Service Room (House Folding Room) in the Longworth Building.

- 4. Consolidation in the Longworth Building of the House Document Room and the Clerk's Document Room, which is now in the Cannon Building, with the Doorkeeper maintaining jurisdiction over the House Document Room and assuming new jurisdiction over the Clerk's Document Room.
- 5. Provision of an administrative office for the Publications Distribution Service in the West Garage in part of the area now occupied by the Majority and Minority Printing Rooms, where space would also be allocated for priority work of moderate quantity; relocation of the rest of the Publications Distribution Service's operations to House Annex 2.
- 6. Provision of one administrative office each for the Majority and Minority printing operations at or near their present locations, with these offices and the West Garage operations of the Publications Distribution Service contiguously located, and relocation of all printing presses, related mechanical equipment and storage facilities to House Annex 2.
- 7. Relocation of all Executive liaison offices from the Rayburn Building to House Annex 1.
- 8. Relocation of all or most of those operations conducted in connection with the activities of a sole political party. (The Democratic and the Republican Leadership would each receive a suite in House Annex 1, with the usage to be determined by respective party leaders. Activities not assigned to the spaces in House Annex 1 would be relocated to House Annex 2.) Groups or organizations to the extent they engage in such partisan election activities as campaign fundraising and support or endorsement of individual candidates would be removed from buildings under the control of the Architect of the Capitol, or, alternatively, would be allowed to relocate to

Annex 2 contingent upon the agreement of such groups or organizations to compensate the Congress for use of space at a rate established by law. Affected by the plan would be the Democratic Steering and Policy Committee, the House Democratic Caucus, the Democratic National Congressional Committee, the Democratic Research Organization, the House Democratic Study Group, the National Republican Congressional Committee, the House Republican Conference, the House Republican Policy Committee, the House Republican Research Committee, the Republican Study Committee, and the House Wednesday Group.

9. Relocation to House Annex 2 of the Congressional Black Caucus, the Congressional Rural Caucus, the Congressional Staff Club, the Doormen's Society, the Environmental Study Conference, the New Members' Caucus, the project under which a multivolume compilation of House procedures is being prepared in space assigned to the Parliamentarian, the Office of Technology Assessment, and most of

the facilities of the United States Capitol Police.

10. General consolidation of those news media accommodations now occupying space in the three House Office Buildings, and remodeling of certain existing facilities for news conferences and similar activities.

11. Redesign of certain rooms on the first floor of the Independence Avenue corridor in the Rayburn Building for use on a daily basis as hearing or meeting rooms without exclusive assignment to specific

committees or groups.

12. Consolidation in the existing main House Post Office in the Longworth Building of all major House postal services, with automatic stamp and mailing machines being installed in the Cannon and Rayburn Buildings for easy access following the removal of the branch postal facilities from those buildings.

It is the strong recommendation of the Commission that all of the space left vacant in the Capitol and in the House Office Buildings upon completion of the relocations outlined in this report be assigned to Members and Committees. Only through such priority assignments can the goal of the Commission—the greatest overall benefit for

Members, both collectively and individually—be achieved.

The recommendations in this report concerning proposed relocations are relatively general in that they neither refer, for the most part, to the exact sizes and locations of the spaces to be occupied by transferred facilities nor do they deal with the specifics of how the vacated space might be assigned to Members and committees. The Commission recognizes that it is not within its authority to prepare an office-by-office assignment schedule but it feels that there is an urgent necessity for the development of a comprehensive overall plan in cooperation with the Architect of the Capitol to insure that all Members will benefit equitably from the entire series of transitions and to avoid piecemeal assignments which might be undesirable on a long range basis.

The Commission further recommends that full advantage be taken whenever possible of the opportunities offered by the proposed changes, especially insofar as the moves to House Annex 2 are concerned, to provide relocated nonlegislative activities with space equally or more desirable in terms of consolidated operations or usable square footage.

#### INTRODUCTION

Acting under the authority of H. Res. 988 "to conduct a thorough and complete study \* \* \* with respect to the facilities and space requirements \* \* \* of the House, including space utilization \* \* \*, the House Commission on Information and Facilities:

1. Inventoried all space currently under the jurisdiction of the House

of Representatives:

2. Established categories of activities beginning with "Category A: Leadership functions demanding constant access to the floor" and ending with "Category E: Nonlegislative functions such as political party organizations or research operations not requiring frequent or any access to the floor":

3. Analyzed current space utilization in terms of these categories;

and

4. Developed recommendations for certain changes in space assignments to insure that legislative needs for proximity to the floor are more easily met without depriving other supporting activities of appro-

priate space accommodations.

The Commission began its work by preparing a complete compilation of all space allocations on the House side of the Capitol Building; in the Cannon, Longworth, and Rayburn House Office Buildings; in the underground garages; in House Office Building Annex 1 (the former Congressional Hotel); and in the recently acquired Federal Bureau of Investigation Identification Building, which is now House Office Building Annex 2. Letters were then sent to 34 nonlegislative functions requesting them to assess their usage of more than 100 locations. Staff meetings were held to discuss the activities of many of these operations, and staff members visited and checked several to determine the extent of usage during typical workday periods.

The replies to the letters as well as the individual discussions were given careful consideration and were evaluated in the light of personal understanding as well as the facts which have been compiled. Decisions were made to recommend the relocation of various functions and the reassignment of certain offices, and the suggested changes

were grouped according to the following classifications:

1. Reassignments and relocations in which the changes include new usage of space in the Capitol, the House Office Buildings, and House Annex 1, and

2. Relocations involving moves solely to House Annex 2.

Working from the premise that space in the Capitol and in the Cannon, Longworth, and Rayburn House Office Buildings should be reserved, insofar as is practicable, for those Members, committees, officers, and functions which require most immediate access to the floor, the Commission attempted to obtain accurate expressions of

opinion from various officials and other individuals associated with the nonlegislative activities assigned space by the House so that all viewpoints could be considered as the Commission prepared recom-

mendations to implement its position.

The Commission anticipated a general reluctance to relocate, and its expectations were borne out. Therefore, special attention was given in considering proposed relocations to the need for compensating for the inconveniences associated with moving, breaking old patterns, and shifting to uncustomary conditions. The Commission felt, for instance, that in conjunction with relocations there should be new services and features whenever necessary, such as provisions to assure suitable passage or transportation so that Members and employees could travel quickly among the House Office Buildings without being exposed to inclement weather.

# POSSIBLE REASSIGNMENTS AND RELOCATIONS IN WHICH THE CHANGES INCLUDE NEW USAGE OF SPACE IN THE CAPITOL, THE HOUSE OFFICE BUILDINGS, AND HOUSE OFFICE BUILDING ANNEX 1

OFFICES USED BY THE BILL CLERK, THE JOURNAL CLERK, THE READING CLERKS, AND THE TALLY CLERK

Rooms affected.—H-324 and H-324M (the upper level of H-324) in the Capitol.

Assignee.—Clerk of the House.

Possible New Location.—The two-level office used by the House Bill, Journal, Reading, and Tally Clerks could be relocated to H-226, the principal service office of the House Document Room adjacent to

Statuary Hall in the Capitol.

Comments.—Moving the operations of the aforementioned Clerks from their present location to the House Document Room facilities next to the floor level of Statuary Hall would open up space suitable for use by Members for off-the-floor work while continuing to provide the clerks with ample accommodations close to the floor.

#### OFF-THE-FLOOR WORK AREA FOR MEMBERS

Conversion of the space vacated by the Clerks into work areas, including some containing open-air work cubicles, would provide Members with accommodations, available on a first-come-first-served basis to assure equitable usage, which could be used for dictation, signing mail, reading, or similar work which Members might wish to do while remaining close to the floor. Such facilities for the exclusive use of Members and whatever staff personnel they might authorize would provide a needed expansion of the accommodations provided by the Rayburn Room in the Capitol with the additional advantage of supplying space where work could be done near the floor with a relative degree of freedom from unofficial interruptions.

#### House Document Room

Rooms affected.—HT-50, HT-52 through HT-59, HT-61, HB-3, H-226, H-325 and H-422, all in the House Wing of the Capitol.

Assignee.—Doorkeeper.

Possible new location.—The Document Room could be moved to space now occupied by the House Publications Distribution Service (House Folding Room), Rooms B-208 and B-241, both in the Longworth Building.

Comments.—The manner in which the space now occupied by the House Document Room is used, results in inefficiency, wasted time, and other unsatisfactory conditions. Sizeable waiting lines of Congressional employees and the general public are frequently observed

in space which could be better utilized. Trucks servicing the Document Room often drive across and park on Capitol property in a way which is unsightly and potentially dangerous to Members and visitors

Relocated in the suggested space in the Longworth Building, the Document Room would be adjacent to the better loading facilities provided by the Longworth platform and could fulfill its function in an improved manner by using direct telephone tielines to the floor, messengers on duty for immediate responses to Members' requests during appropriate periods, and two separate distribution counters, one of which would be reserved for official congressional requirements and the other for use by the public.

#### CLERK'S DOCUMENT ROOM

Rooms affected.—B-26, B-28, and B-30, all in the Cannon Building. Assignee. Clerk of the House.

Possible new location.—This facility could be consolidated with the relocated House Document Room in the Longworth Building.

Comments.—Consolidation of the House and the Clerk's Document Rooms would be advantageous because of the similarity of their functions and service requirements.

#### House Publications Distribution Service Room (House FOLDING ROOM)

Rooms affected.—B-201, B-202, B-204, B-208, and B-241, all in the Longworth Building.

Assignee.—Doorkeeper.

Possible new location.—The Publications Distribution Room could be moved in a manner which would enable the Distribution Service to maintain an administrative office and certain other facilities in part of the easily accessible space now used by the Majority and Minority printing services in the West Garage while the rest of the Distribution Service's operations are relocated to House Annex 2.

Comments.—Relocated to the West Garage and to House Annex 2, the House Publications Distribution Service would continue to be accessible and to maintain the ability to conduct its operations efficiently. The facilities in the West Garage would provide space for administrative operations and the handling of moderate quantities of priority work. The relocation of other functions related to the processing of bulk workloads to House Annex 2 would make available a significant amount of space in the House Office Buildings complex for priority usage. The Commission feels that those operations of the Publications Distribution Service which are moved to the West Garage should be located adjacent to the Majority and Minority Printing Rooms because of their similarly oriented functions.

#### MAJORITY AND MINORITY PRINTING ROOMS

Rooms affected and assignees.—WA-29 (Majority) and WA-26

(Minority), both in the West Garage.

Possible new locations.—The Majority and the Minority could each be assigned one individual room at or near their present offices for administrative work and the printing presses, related machinery and

storage facilities could be moved to House Annex 2.

Comments.—With one administrative office for each organization located at or in the vicinity of the present printing rooms, personnel of the Majority and Minority printing staffs would continue to be convenient to Members' offices for the placing of orders, consultations, and similar work connected with their operations. Relocation of the printing and related mechanical equipment and the storage facilities to House Annex 2 would make available the space they now occupy for operations with a higher priority in the general space assignment plan.

**EXECUTIVE LIAISON OFFICES** 

Rooms affected.—B-320, B-322, B-324, B-325, B-328, B-330, and

B-332, all in the Rayburn Building.

Assignees.—Defense-Armed Services Liaison Offices (B-320, B-322, B-324, and B-325), Civil Service Commission Liaison Office (B-332), and Veterans' Administration Liaison Office (B-328 and B-330).

Possible new location.—The Executive liaison offices could be moved to House Annex 1 and all be located on the same floor.

Comments.—Relocating the liaison offices to House Annex 1 would maintain their accessibility while making available select space in the Rayburn Building for functions with a more direct legislative priority.

Political Party Offices (Democratic)

Rooms affected.—1320, 1418, 1420, 1422, and 1518, all in the Longworth Building; B-352 and B-353 in the Rayburn Building; and 303 and 314 in House Annex 1.

Assignees.—Democratic Steering and Policy Committee (1320 Longworth), House Democratic Caucus (1518 Longworth), Democratic National Congressional Committee (B-352 and B-353 Rayburn and 303 House Annex 1), Democratic Research Organization (314 House Annex 1), and House Democratic Study Group (1418, 1420 and 1422 Longworth).

Possible new locations.—See Comments below.

Comments.—The Democratic Party and the Republican Party could be assigned one suite each in House Annex 1. The usage of this space would be determined by the respective party leaderships, which could assign accommodations, insofar as the space might allow, to activities or portions of activities from any or all of the Democratic-affiliated or Republican-affiliated operations. Activities not assigned to the available space in House Annex 1 would be reocated to House Annex 2.

#### POLITICAL PARTY OFFICES (REPUBLICAN)

Rooms affected.—134, 135, and 505, all in the Cannon Building; 1616, 1618, 1620, and 1622, all in the Longworth Building; and 304,

305, 321, 322, and 508 through 522, all in House Annex 1.

Assignees.—Office of the Minority Clerk (505 Cannon); National Republican Conference (1618 Longworth and 321 and 322 House Annex 1), House Republican Policy Committee (1616 Longworth), House Republican Research Committee (1620 and 1622 Longworth),

Republican Study Committee (134 and 135 Cannon), and House Wednesday Group (304 and 305 House Annex 1).

Possible new locations, and comments.—Same as those under the above listing, "Political Party Offices—Democratic."

#### U.S. CAPITOL POLICE

Rooms affected.—B-207, B-218, and B-220, all in the Longworth Building; SW-2 in the Rayburn Building, and the ground floor of House Annex 1.

Assignee.--United States Capitol Police.

Possible new locations.—See Comments below.

Comments.—In order to insure their capability for effective protection and law enforcement activities, the Capitol Police must have certain facilities in close proximity to the Capitol and the House Office Buildings. Appropriate space should be available for such needs, but the consolidation of all other administrative, briefing, training, locker, and storage accommodations in House Annex 2, with existing transportation arrangements being adjusted to take officers to and from their posts, seems feasible.

#### House Lierary

Rooms affected.—B-14, B-16, B-18, and B-25, all in the Cannon Building.

Assignee.—Clerk of the House.

Possible new location. See Comments below.

Comments.—Since it has been proposed that the House Library facilities be relocated to the new James Madison Memorial Library upon completion of that structure, the Commission feels that it should attempt to avoid the necessity of two moves, and, therefore, recommends that no change be made at this time insofar as the House Library is concerned. At the same time, the Commission considers it to be of interest in discussing space utilization in the House Office Buildings to report on the limited usage made of these accommodations. During the period June 24, 1975 through July 4, 1975, the House Library as well as the Library of Congress Bookrooms in the Cannon, Longworth, and Rayburn Office Buildings were visited a total of 185 times by Commission staff members, during which 108 persons were observed utilizing facilities. The lack of usage was particularly noticeable in the House Library in the Cannon Building, where during 63 staff visits only one person was found to be using the facilities. On most of the visits the library was closed or without an aide to assist patrons. In commenting on the House Library situation, the Commission wishes to make clear distinction that only the House Library facilities under the jurisdiction of the Clerk should, in the opinion of the Commission, be moved upon completion of the Madison Memorial Library, and that the Library of Congress Bookrooms in the three House Office Buildings should remain in their present locations.

#### Branch Offices of the House Post Office

Rooms affected.—Post Office branches in the Cannon and Rayburn Buildings.

Assignee.—House Postmaster.

Possible new location.—See Comments below.

Comments.—During the period from June 24, 1975 through July 4, 1975, the Post Office branch offices in the Cannon and Rayburn Buildings were visited by Commission staff a total of 120 times, including several extended visits totaling approximately 6 hours. During the 120 visits, 218 persons were observed using the facilities. There was a considerable drop in usage during the Independence Day congressional recess. The consolidation of all major postal services in the main House Post Office in the Longworth Building seems possible. Some of the services now provided by the branch Post Offices in the Cannon and Rayburn Buildings could, upon the consolidation of these facilities with the main office, be supplied by conveniently located automatic stamp and mailing machines.

#### NEWS MEDIA ACCOMMODATIONS

Rooms affected.—300, 302, and 344, all in the Cannon Building; 1142 Longsworth Building, and B-364, B-365, B-366, 2101, and 2102, all in the Rayburn Building.

Assignee.—Doorkeeper.

Possible new location and remodeling of existing facilities.—The news media accommodations in the three House Buildings could be relocated and changed as follows: (1) a general consolidation of these news media accommodations in space now being used in the Longworth Building by the administrative offices of the Publications Distribution Service, and (2) a remodeling of Rooms B-364, B-365, and B-366 in the Rayburn Building for use by all of the news media for press conferences and similar news-related activities.

Comments.—During the same June 24-July 4 period in which the usage of the House bookrooms and the Post Office annexes were inspected, the press rooms in the Cannon Building were visited by Commission staff 63 times and those in the Rayburn Building 62 times. Although the Cannon facility was visited seven times per day with 33 of the visits lasting a total of approximately 10 hours, the accommodations were found to be closed and locked on each occasion. During the 62 visits to the press rooms in the Rayburn Building, the facilities were open but empty 28 times, and on the other visits a total of 18 persons were observed using the rooms. The radio-TV rooms in the Rayburn Building were also visited 62 times, and during these visits, 31 persons were observed using the facilities. On 20 of the 62 visits, the rooms were open but entirely empty.

A general consolidation of all press-radio-TV facilities in space in the Longworth Building which is now occupied by the administrative offices of the Publications Distribution Service is possible. This consolidation should be accompanied by a remodeling of Rooms B-364, B-365, and B-366 in the Rayburn Building for use by all of the news media for press conferences and similar news-related activities. Such remodeling would include the installation of permanent lighting and other equipment required for news coverage by the press, radio, and television. These accommodations should be supplemented for the coverage of especially newsworthy events by the utilization of rooms made available by the speaker in the vicinity of the events

being covered.

### Independence Avenue Corridor, First Floor, Rayburn Building

Rooms affected.—2101, 2102, 2103, and 2105, all in the Rayburn Building.

Assignces.—Doorkeeper (2101 and 2102 for the news media), C&P

Telephone Company (2103), and House Postmaster (2105).

Comments.—These rooms could be redesigned specifically as hearing rooms for assignment on a daily basis at the discretion of the Speaker. The telephone office should, in the opinion of the Commission be moved to a portion of the space now occupied by the United States Capitol Police on the west side of the basement level of the Longworth Building. (Room 2104 is now occupied by a Member. However, if it becomes available, consideration should be given to redesigning and reassigning this suite as a hearing room.)

### RELOCATIONS INVOLVING MOVES SOLELY TO HOUSE OFFICE BUILDING ANNEX 2

The Commission recognizes and is personally acquainted with the importance of the work done by the groups included in this section of the report. It recommends that they be relocated to Annex 2 since, as has been noted in recommendations concerning the relocations of other nonlegislative functions, the space they now occupy could be better utilized for the benefit of Members if it were assigned directly to Members themselves or committees.

CONGRESSIONAL BLACK CAUCUS

Rooms affected. -306 and 307 House Annex 1.

DOORMEN'S SOCIETY

Room affected.—308 House Annex 1.

CONGRESSIONAL RURAL CAUCUS

Room affected.—309 House Annex 1.

CONGRESSIONAL STAFF CLUB

Room affected.—333 Cannon Building.

#### PARLIAMENTARIAN'S ROOM

Room affected.—B-307 Rayburn Building.

Comments.—This space, assigned to the Parliamentarian, is being used for the preparation and production of Deschler's Precedents, a multivolume work to summarize House procedures from 1959 to present.

#### Relocations Already Underway or Planned

OFFICES OF THE ARCHITECT OF THE CAPITOL

The Construction Management Division of the Office of the Architect of the Capitol has moved from Rooms B-307, B-308, and B-317 in the Rayburn Building to House Annex 2, and these facilities in the Rayburn Building have been reassigned to committees.

#### Offices of Technology Assessment

The Office of Technology Assessment is planning to consolidate all of its operations in House Annex 2. Included in the space involved in the moves are Rooms 405, 408, and 409 in House Annex 1 as well as

rooms under the jurisdiction of the Senate and the Library of Congress, and leased accommodations in motels.

#### Timing of Recommended Relocations

The Commission recognizes that many of its relocation proposals affect service operations which must be maintained on a continuing schedule as well as politically oriented activities which would be adversely affected by untimely disruptions. Therefore, the Commission recommends that measures be taken prior to any relocations to insure the smooth continuity of the activities which are involved.

The Commission further recommends that, insofar as possible, new services and features be provided whenever necessary, prior to the relocations, to compensate for the possible loss of certain conveniences and facilities. Included in the Commission's thoughts connected with this recommendation are the availability of dining accommodations, parking areas, quick and weather-protected transportation among the House buildings, and similar items of legitimate concern to those affected by the moves.

Conclusion

Implementation of the possible space reassignments mentioned in the Introduction would facilitate the legislative processes of the House of Representatives by providing more numerous and more accessible accommodations for those activities directly connected with the legislative duties of Members and committees. At the same time, adequate accommodations would be provided in new locations for activities not requiring frequent access to the House floor.

## SUPPLEMENTAL VIEWS OF REPRESENTATIVES ELIZABETH HOLTZMAN, JAMES G. O'HARA AND PHILIP M. CRANE, DISSENTING IN PART


We respectfully dissent from Commission Recommendations 8 and 9 on proposed relocations. These recommendations propose moving groups including the Democratic Study Group, Republican Study Committee, and the Congressional Black Caucus from House Office

Buildings to House Annex Buildings.

We disagree with these recommendations because the Commission held no hearings on this subject and received insufficient information to justify the conclusion that moving these organizations would not impair their ability to assist Members of Congress in their legislative functions. We cannot join in this recommendation without a detailed presentation of the needs of these organizations and the needs of Members for their services.

We regret that the Commission is unable to make a recommendation about the feasibility of converting approximately 25,000 square feet of space on the terrace level of the Capital for use by Members of Congress. This area, if convertible, could provide workspace for Members of Congress and additional committee and conference rooms. Unfortunately, the Architect of the Capitol did not provide a feasibility study containing sufficient data from which a judgment, either pro or con, could be made. We hope that the House Building Commission will authorize a conclusive study so that a decision can be made on the terrace space in the near future.

### ADDITIONAL SUPPLEMENTAL VIEWS DISSENTING IN PART

We concur with the views of Representative Holtzman regarding the proposed relocation of groups which provide basic research services Members need to carry out their legislative responsibilities.

These service groups play an important role in the legislative process and, therefore, should be given some degree of preference in the assignment of office space. They may have little "need for proximity to the floor"—the main standard applied by the Commission in making its recommendations—but they do require proximity to Members and committees to carry out their function. Virtually every Member of the House depends on one or more of these groups for basic research services, and most of the groups believe their ability to continue providing such services would be seriously impaired by the proposed relocations.

The nine groups involved presently occupy some 6,320 square feet of space. This represents one-half of 1 percent of the available office space in the House and about 12 percent of the office space involved in the relocation recommended by the Commission.

Altogether the proposed moves would open up some 50,000 square feet of space in the following areas: Capitol (5,700 sq. ft.), Rayburn (13,040 sq. ft.), Longworth (10,720 sq. ft.), Cannon (3,430 sq. ft.), and Annex No. 1 (15,320 sq. ft.). The space involved is presently being used by the following functions: Party campaign committees (10,800 sq. ft.), Document Room and storage (7,500 sq. ft.), Capitol Police (6,400 sq. ft.), Member service groups (6,320 sq. ft.), party leadership entities (5,435 sq. ft.), executive liaison offices (4,850 sq. ft.), news media rooms (4,100 sq. ft.), and miscellaneous other offices (5,400 sq. ft.).

While various party leadership entities such as the Democratic Steering and Policy Committee and the Office of the Caucus Chairman—and their Republican counterparts—are included in the relocation recommendations, it is difficult to envision that they will be moved further away from the Capitol. Thus, if both the leadership entities and the Member service groups were left in their present locations, the other proposed moves would still open up nearly 40,000 square feet of additional space for Members and committees.

Moreover, there is more than 80,000 square feet in the Capitol and the various office buildings currently being used by entities which have no legislative function whatsoever and no apparent need for proximity to the floor.

The largest block of such space is being used by the Architect of the Capitol. The Architect is currently occupying more than 50 rooms totaling 26,000 square feet on the House side of the Capitol alone, plus about 2,000 square feet of office space in the Rayburn Building. (The Architect also occupies at least 11,000 square feet of space on the

Senate side of the Capitol.) Some of the Architect's space in the Capitol is being used to house permanently-installed mechanical equipment or is otherwise unfit for office use. However, about 8,000 square feet could be converted to office space and some 10,000 square feet—primarily on the Terrace Level overlooking the Mall—is already being used as offices for administrative and other support activities of the Architect such as the drafting, accounting, and engineering offices; the art and reference division; and the sheet metal, carpenter, and

plumbing shops.

Other examples of nonlegislative functions in the Rayburn, Longworth, Cannon, and Annex 1 House Office Buildings include the following: the Office of Records and Registration (2,000 sq. ft.), House Information System (3,900 sq. ft.), the Employment Office (2,000 sq. ft.), party photographers (2,338 sq. ft.), beauty shop (1,800 sq. ft.), barber shops (1,400 sq. ft.), sauna (800 sq. ft.), the Patronage Committee (500 sq. ft.), property supply office (1,500 sq. ft.), FDR Memorial Office (490 sq. ft.), Internal Security Committee (490 sq. ft.), the Democratic Club (5,000 sq. ft.), Members' living quarters (10,000 sq. ft.), and the Executive Liaison offices (4,850 sq. ft.), which would only be moved from Rayburn to Annex 1.

Certainly some of these functions—especially those which have no need for proximity either to the floor or to Members and committees—should be relocated rather than moving groups which need such prox-

imity to provide basic legislative services to Members.
